

Robert passed away on September 28, 2023. Mr. Ludwig was 93 years old and joined the Society in 1968.



The Fall season has been an exciting one. October and November stated meetings featured outstanding presentations.



A Royally Good Time

At October's Stated Meeting, members were royally entertained and majestically educated by the talented actress Mary Ann Jung as she performed and portrayed Mary Queen of Scotland. Invited by John "Jack" Gordon, MD, head of the Hospitality Committee, Queen Mary instructed members, through demonstrations with four selected participants, Jim Dawson, Scott Hinson, Rebacca Papa, and Dee Stahl, the etiquette, customs, and past times during her reign in the mid-1500's.

Included in Queen Mary's teachings were the proper manners for greeting others. For men, handshakes were a grip of each other's forearm to secure there was no hidden weapon there with a strong slap on the other's back to ensure no weapon was there also. Women's greetings were much simpler with hands folded in front and a delicate curtsy with head bowed. Closer female friends gave each other a kiss on each cheek, which is from the Queen's French upbringing.

Queen Mary also enlightened members on popular foods of those times, recreational activities such as chess, archery, horseback riding, and hunting, and the proper attire for both genders with displays of head pieces and an explanation of clothing styles, colors, and their status significance.

Mary Ann Jung's performance as Queen Mary, interesting and entertaining monarch, captivated everyone with a delightful evening of laughter, interaction, and enjoyable learning. Hail to the Queen!



"Secret" Information Q&A

Barry Donadio, former military officer on the security team for US Presidents before joining the Secret Service, held an interactive question and answer session at the Stated Meeting on November 9, 2023. Barry, currently a Private Detective and President of Public Security, LLC, kept members engaged with his insider's view of several historic occurrences including the September 11th attack on the Pentagon, protecting President Clinton on Air Force One, and the TWA airplane crash of 1996. He authored a book titled *TWA Flight 800: First Responder Witness Account* based on his involvement moments after the incident.

In addition to sharing events' information, Barry admitted he'd done a bit of Scottish research for the group and found that the FBI had created the Secret Service, Abraham Lincoln conducted secret intelligence work with his friend Allan Pinkerton (a Scot), the Davidson brothers of Harley-Davidson motorcycles were Scottish, and 27 US Presidents were of Scottish descent including Clinton, Obama, and Trump. He also revealed that the image of Uncle Sam was based on Samuel Wilson, a Massachusetts meat packer whose grandfather was from Scotland.

Though no "top secrets" were revealed, the Stated Meeting was another entertaining event.

Scottish Immigrant

John Johnston (merchant)

January 22, 1781 - April 20, 1851

John Johnston was a Scottish-American bookkeeper and merchant who was a co-founder of New York University.

Johnston was born on January 22, 1781, at Barnboard Mill in the



Parish of Balmaghie, Gallowayshire, Scotland. He was a son of John Johnston and Dorothea (néeProudfoot) Johnston, who married in 1780. After his mother's death in June 1794, his father remarried to Margaret Rae in 1795. Johnston, an only child of his parents' marriage, became the elder brother to ten half-siblings, including brothers William, Robert, Samuel, and sisters Agnes and Margaret, as well as uncle to John Taylor Sherman.

His paternal grandparents were William Johnston and Janet (née McCreedy) Johnston and he was educated in the neighboring village of Laurieston, and also at Boreland.

In 1804, at twenty-two years old, he came to New York and became a bookkeeper in Robert Lenox's counting house. After nine years with Lenox and Maitland, Johnston and partner James Boorman established the merchant house Boorman, Johnston, & Co. in 1813. The firm, based at 57 South Street, sold Scotch goods and, later, tobacco from Virginia and wines from Madeira and Italy. They also owned an iron warehouse at 119 Greenwich Street and, in 1828, admitted Adam Norrie as a partner.

Johnston was elected a member of the Saint Andrew's Society of New York in 1811. He served as its manager from 1819 to 1823, second vice-president from 1823 to 1827, first vice-president from 1827 to 1828 and president from 1831 to 1832.

In 1839, Johnston and several other civic-minded New Yorkers founded the University of the City of New York (today known as New York University). He was also a co-founder of Washington Square North. On September 2, 1817, Johnston married Margaret (née Taylor) Howard (1784–1879). She was a widow of Rhesa Howard Jr., himself a nephew of William Few, signer of the U.S. Constitution from Georgia whose brother-in-law was U.S. Secretary of the Treasury Albert Gallatin. Margaret, the daughter of John Taylor and Margaret (née Scott) Taylor, had four siblings who, likewise, married two grandchildren, a great-granddaughter, and a nephew of founding father Roger Sherman, signer of the U.S. Constitution and the U.S. Declaration of Independence from Connecticut. Together, John and Margaret were the parents of:

John Taylor Johnston (1820–1893), who married Frances Colles (1826–1888), the daughter of Harriet (née Wetmore) Colles and James Colles, a prominent merchant in New York and New Orleans.

- Andrew Taylor Johnston (1821–1821), who died in infancy.
- James Boorman Johnston (1822–1887), who married Mary Hoppins Humphreys. He commissioned the Tenth Street Studio Building at 51 West 10th Street between Fifth and Sixth Avenues. They were the parents of artist John Humphreys Johnston.
- Margaret Taylor Johnson (1825–1875), who married John Bard (a grandson of Dr. Samuel Bard) in 1849 and became founders of Bard College.
- Emily Proudfoot Johnston (1827–1831), who died in infancy.

Johnston, who suffered from gout, died on April 20, 1851, at his residence, 7 Washington Square in New York City.

Book Review



A Time of Love and Tartan

by Alexander McCall Smith 4.5 4.5 out of 5 stars Book 12 of 17: The Scotland Street series

Synopsis

The latest installment of Alexander McCall Smith's perennially popular and irresistibly charming 44 Scotland Street series.



When Pat accepts her narcissistic ex-boyfriend Bruce's invitation for coffee, she has no idea of the complications in her romantic and professional life that will follow. Meanwhile, Matthew, her boss at the art gallery, attracts the attention of the police after a misunderstanding at the local bookstore.

Whether caused by small things such as a cup of coffee and a book, or major events such as Stuart's application for promotion and his wife Irene's decision to pursue a PhD in Aberdeen, change is coming to Scotland Street. But for three seven-year-old boys--Bertie Pollock, Ranald, and Big Lou's foster son, Finlay--it also means getting a glimpse of perfect happiness.

Alexander McCall Smith's delightfully witty, wise and sometimes surreal comedy spirals out in surprising ways in this new installment, but its heart remains where it has always been, at the center of life in Edinburgh's New Town.

Review

Anyone who has spent any time in Scotland's ancient capital, Edinburgh, should read any and all of the 44 Scotland Street series. AMS has created a set of believable characters; most of them as likable as they are believable. He also evokes the "feel" of Edinburgh, the warts as well as the city's many delightful qualities. Probably the most interesting character is also the most detestable one, Irene Pollock, an intellectual dominatrix -- an arrogant sexist-feminist know-it-all, the kind whose rear end you would like to kick up through her mouth, to borrow the words of my sainted Scottish grandfather. She is the mother of Bertie, a truly wonderful little boy of 7, whom she is striving to de-man, when she is not trying to do the same to her husband. However -- in "A Time of Love and Tartan" there is hope -- she may be leaving for Aberdeen, though what Aberdeen has done to deserve her is not made clear. All told, a delightful read, as are all the books in this series.
